June Meeting top

This month's meeting was a composite demonstration by John Wilemski at his house where he's working on his Cozy MK-IV project.

John demonstrated a wide range of composite operations and tools. First he described the different foam types and their uses:

- 1. Polystyrene Foam For structural parts like airfoils
- 2. <u>Divinycell Foam</u> for fuel baffles and tank walls
- 3. <u>Polyether Polyurethane (last-a-foam) Foam</u> for non-structural complex shapes, as it's very easy to sand

Next John demostrated mixing epoxy (<u>West Systems</u> in this case) with <u>microballoons</u> to create micro, and then applying this with a <u>squeeagee</u> to foam board to fill the voids. Then he showed us how to apply and wet out two layers of <u>bidirectional fiberglass cloth</u> and <u>peel ply</u> on top of this to create a finished part. As he shared, West is workable for about 15 minutes and cures firm in a day, and completely in about 3.

Next he showed us his hot-wire setup for creating foam cores from templates, such as a canard wing. First a block of blue foam is cut slightly large, and a level line is scribed on both sides. Next the template's level like is attached on either end with nails to the foam. The template is numbered so that folks on either end can syncronize the wire to the same speed, each person should reach the #3 at the same time, for instance. This corrects for wire lag and keeps it reasonably square to the part. The hot wire is made of two pieces of steel bar in a 2"x4" board with Safety Wire strung between them, with a way to turn one bar to tighten the wire. The a power supply (a 2A battery charger in this case) is connected to each bar. The hot wire is then tested on a piece of scrap foam, and if it cuts and leaves fine "angel hairs" of foam, it's at the

right temperature.

John and several assistants then hot-wired a small canard core. John then had several other canard core's completed beforehand to show the various steps in the process:

- 1. cut off the nose
- 2. lay up the spar caps
- 3. glue the nose back on
- 4. micro one side of the core
- 5. lay up same side of the core, peel ply end
- 6. remove peel ply and sand back a bit so you get glass-to-glass contact, layup other side (core has recess so no ridge is created

After the demos were over, several of us helped John flip the fuselage over and attached the wings, canard, canopy, and instrument cover.

FAA TO CHART CONTACT FREQUENCIES FOR MOAS, RESTRICTED **AREAS**

Instead of feeling compelled to fly around charted military operations areas (MOAs) and restricted areas, soon you'll be able to gather real-time status information in the air to determine if you can safely fly through the airspace. The Air Force and Air National Guard have worked with the FAA to provide contact frequencies for an FAA center controller, military air traffic controller, or range control officer for each MOA and restricted area so that pilots can make a radio call to see if the airspace is active, and if it is, at what altitudes. The frequencies will appear with new charting cycles and be completed by the August cycle. Read more on AOPA Online.

FSS TIP OF THE WEEK: KICK THE 'K'

In an international context, airports in the 48 contiguous United States are prefixed with the ICAO country code "K." Because Lockheed Martin's flight service computer system is set up to automatically assume flights are domestic, pilots should not precede their airport identifier with a K unless they plan to fly internationally. Stating the K up front for a domestic flight could create extra steps for the briefer, thus slowing the process. Remember to phonetically spell airport identifiers to avoid miscommunication.
