

AL AND NANCY KENKEL VISIT NORMANDY

This year marked the 75th anniversary of the D-Day Normandy Invasion and the real beginning of the Allied Army's rescue of the European Continent. Chapter member Al Kenkel and his wife Nancy, visited the beach at Normandy in late October of this year and shared these pictures and impressions:

"You can read about the landings and strategies all you want, but the experience of standing on the beach promotes a feeling of awe and indebtedness to the young boys that faced fear and dedicated themselves to the cause. The cemetery—row after row of crosses—brings sorrow and pride at the same time. By the way, a German cemetery has also been erected, but our tour guide refuses to take groups there. Members of the SS are buried there, and this brings negativity to many French people including him. When entering in the pill boxes and looking over the ocean, you get a real sense of the drama facing the Germans as they tried to defend the beach. If I travel to France again, I'd plan to revisit the beach."
