


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THE GREAT AERO LIFT ADVENTURE



Similar to the one-day bootcamp event held in Indianapolis, and attended by Joey and Roger this past year, this is an expanded two-day format, with Chapter leaders attending from across the globe. We had two attendees in from Hawaii, and another from Alaska.

After arrival Friday evening, we got to network with each other before dinner, then on to a behind the scenes tour of the Sonex Aircraft factory with Director of Chapters leader, Charlie Becker. Wow! Getting to see the advances they have made in

delivering laser cut, preformed, aluminum pieces with pre-drilled pilot holes was truly impressive. I've included some pictures of the tour below.

Saturday and Sunday were power packed days with back-to-back one-hour sessions! Things got kicked-off by Jack Pelton, EAA CEO. He covered key initiatives that are being focused on in 2020, his perspective on the climate of Aviation in America, and specific advocacy areas where the EAA is partnering with the FAA to protect our freedom to fly. This includes changes in the Light Sport Aircraft category to significantly increase the qualifying aircraft weight and may even include removing the weight restriction all together, moving to performance-based characteristics instead.

The balance of the sessions were presented by Charlie and the Chapters leadership team. Talks spanned from resources available to Chapters, how to keep our Chapter vibrant and growing, how to partner and work with local press outlets, as well as covering new digital system rollouts tied to Young Eagles, and a new website offering.

The passion, enthusiasm, and creative ideas shared by the leadership, and amongst everyone in attendance was invigorating, and a great way to kick of 2020! I look forward to getting to talk more about the session at the upcoming Chapter gathering, but here are a few photos from the weekend to enjoy.












ONCE MORE AROUND THE FIELD, JOEY SHREVE'S 'COUPE
