VMC CLUB WITH BILLY BIE

After a brief intermission, we adjourned to the chapter hangar for Billy Bie's VMC Club. Always fun and informative it is not to be missed. Billy can get all chapter members in attendance Wings Credit which looks good on your record, but really helps your brain and decision making ability!

Billy started off with a VFR quiz about approach lights.. He asked us to identify the lights from a selection of choices on the screen: PAPI, VASI, MALSR or ODAR. PAPI or Precision

Approach Path Indicator, was the correct answer. He pointed out that approach path lights are always located to the left of the runway.

Next was a discussion of Special VFR. Question: Can non IFR private pilot use special VFR?

Answer: Only between sunrise and sunset.

Special VFR requires ATC clearance. Weather minimums are one mile visibility and clear of clouds. Most Class B airports will not issue Special VFR including CVG. FAA recommends local immediate need only.

See the bracket Billy is holding? It's the bracket that holds the throttle cable on his RV7A. While returning from a flight recently he discovered his engine would not go to idle at throttle back to land resulting in a nonlandable condition. It was something easily missed on a condition inspection. Billy urged us to do two things:

- 1. Be meticulous when doing your condition inspections.
- 2. Think about what you do when you find yourself in a non landable condition.
- 3. Choices: pull mixture and deadstick, may need to plan a different approach for safe landing.









AND YET ANOTHER 'COUPE!
