VMC CLUB WITH BILLY BIE...JANUARY 2021



For our first VMC Club session of 2021, our VMC Coordinator Billy Bie first led us through a local airspace review. The airspace around KHAO is either class E or G depending on where you are. Billy recommended that we be familiar with weather limits re cloud clearance and ceilings in these airspaces. He stated that just because it is legal to fly in minimum weather, doesn't mean it's wise or safe.

This lead us into a discussion of Visual Lookout and Collision Avoidance. While having a working radio on board is a valuable tool, the most important tool is our visual scan. Our visual scan should include 10 degrees up and down and 60 degrees right and left. Billy emphasized that just sweeping our head and eyes up and down and side to side is not nearly as effective as stopping no less than 1 second or more each 10 degrees. This gives your vision time to process the view. Be aware of specks in the distance and how they are behaving. If that speck is stationary and growing, it indicates that you are on a collision course. He further pointed out that we should be aware of right of way yield rules. For example, two aircraft approaching head on should both yield via a turn to the right.

The use of the radio is a valuable adjunct to our scan. Billy recommended continuous monitoring of ATC and/or CTAF near busy airports. He further recommended not to hesitate talking to other aircraft, especially in the vicinity of the traffic pattern. Be specific and descriptive as possible about your location in or near the pattern. Be especially aware of other aircraft making non standard procedures. At Butler County we frequently encounter aircraft on long finals, and/or making instrument approaches.

Billy reviewed the midair collision that occurred in 2007 near Blue Ash Airport. There was a combination of confusing or absent communication and visual conflict between high and low wing aircraft. There were also some discrepancies about recent pilot experience.

After a couple of months of no VMC Club due to Holidays and Covid concerns, it was good to have you back again Billy. Thanks again for a great VMC Club presentation. We're look-ing forward to more!!


TIGER MOTH ON THE LIFT
