


THE PREZ SEZ

Improving Margins of Safety... A recipe for success!

Hi everyone,

Each year the EAA publishes an annual notice to air missions (NOTAM) outlining the procedure and routes for all aircraft arriving and departing from Airventure. These procedures are the culmination of years of experience, and input from the FAA and pilot forums highlighting past experiences and lessons learned. This enables Wittman Regional Airport (KOSH) to become the busiest airport in the world for the week of Airventure. In 2024 at



KOSH there were there were 16,780 aircraft operations in the 11day period from July 18-28, which is an average of approximately 113 takeoffs/landings per hour when the airport is open!

After spending the winter refining and improving his prototype, our Young Eagles leader Scott Balmos established our own NOTAM to improve both the safety and overall experience for the 2024 Young Eagles Rally Season. WOW... What an improvement – We even got our own "Fisk" arrival intersection!


Scott established procedures for both ends of the runway and different routes for faster planes and slower

planes. These routes utilized notable local landmarks that both help the pilot be able to dead reckon the route and make the flight very enjoyable to the Young Eagle as we fly over interesting points of interest and terrain.

With up to 13 planes participating in each rally,

and normal traffic operations continuing at the airport, I can personally attest that knowing where each of the rally participating planes would be made the flights less stressful and allowed me to focus more on the experience the Young Eagles were having in the cockpit.

Even with all of the runway resurfacing challenges at the airport this year we still managed to fly 75 Young Eagles this year. A BIG Thank You to Scott and his leadership for continuing to ensure we stay safe and for building out such a great Young Eagles program for our Chapter, and for all the members who were pilots and ground crew at this year's rallies!

Hangar T4E Culver Cadet

Tim Morris, Bill Morris and Matt Wikette acquired parts for three vintage Culver Cadets in September of 2023. One of the Cadets was closer to being airworthy than the other two. Over this past year, the trio restored the Cadet shown in the pictures below. It is now flying. Tim and Bill have flown it regularly. It is powered by a Franklin engine which they have gotten running well. It is an attractive aircraft and the red and white paint scheme does it justice. Well done Tim, Bill and Matt!



Hangar T4B Vans RV9A

We moved next to see Scott Balmos' RV9A. Scott has been flying his RV regularly over the past several years, making numerous long cross county trips to Wisconsin, Florida and Alabama among others. Earlier this year, Scott gave a program to the chapter on how he discovered a burned exhaust valve on one cylinder due a more rapid drop in temperature in one cylinder after flying. Scott, being a very safety conscious cross country instrument flyer,, elected to replace all four cylinders. He now has his RV flying again after several intensive weeks of work. T5I Vans RV6

Immediately across the ramp we visited my next door hangar neighbor Jason Pratt with his RV6. Jason acquired his RV from another builder. He has been flying it for several years with ongoing oil leak problems. He has essentially rebuilt his IO360 engine to "0" time. He has converted his engine to automotive style fuel injection and ignition systems which is battery dependent. Jason is installing a dual lithium battery system with computer controller seen in middle picture. He is working up a major panel upgrade which is still in progress. Beautiful work Jason! Hangar T6K Waiex

A short distance along row T6 we arrived at Brian Charlton's hangar to see his Waiex, pronounced "Y-X" Brian started building his Waiex in 2009 and finished construction in 2011, test flying the same year. It is powered by an Aerosport 4 engine, based on the Volkswagen horizontally opposed, air cooled configuration. It started out with a tailwheel. Later converted it to a nosewheel, recently going back to the original tailwheel set up. Brian says he now has 329 hours of total flight time. He keeps it beautifully polished. Your ship is something to be proud of, Brian!

A long hike to the west side of the field took us to row T10 to see Dick King's beautiful Glastar. It was well worth the trip. Dick's N number is N12YR. There is real significance in that.
